
PINS Keeping Girls in Focus event evaluation

General comments:

- Another excellent PINS seminar: the speakers were all very good and have evoked much thought for future practice. Thank you.
- Brilliant seminar, maybe the practice based workshops could have reported back for those who missed the other 3 workshops?
- Thoroughly enjoyed the day. First time I've been to a PINS event will be back. Liked all 3 speakers all brought different skills and info to the table.
- Overall the day was positive, namely the workshops which were excellent from the
 two I attended (LGBT Youth and HOTS/Young Mums). Early part of the day felt focus
 and relevance was very focused around schools and those working with schools
 rather than a wider focus on inclusion for girls in education and how we all are
 working in partnership to enable and empower girls.

- Hard wooden chairs very uncomfortable to sit on all day. It was very much based on secondary young people, would like a bit more on early intervention.
- Good mix of presentations and activities' opportunities to talk, network and reflect.

Comments specifically about the plenary presentations and practice-based workshops/presentations:

- Very thought-provoking presentation from Gillean got me looking at gender and educational 'labels' differently... Thank you, enjoyable and useful day. Dr Gillean McCluskey's presentation was of great interest, well presented, paced and delivered (as were all presentations).
- It would have been good to have practice groups related to younger age groups.
- Academic contributions from Gillean McCluskey and John McKendrick were very good. Workshop input was less so. Disappointed that 'gender' was misused – people I think were referring to sex.
- Girls from Girls Brigade were inspirational and a credit to themselves and organisation.
- Workshops, although informative, were more of presentations. Didn't feel there was enough about practice that could be taken forward. Speakers were very informative.
- Maybe I misunderstood; I would have liked more information about the practice rather than the service set-up. PS Seats hard.
- I'd have liked the LGBT group to get behind the figures. Too much time on percentages and not enough analysis.
